IT BEGAN AS A DREAM

The Paralympic movement began as a dream of the English neurosurgeon Sir Ludwig Guttman. He wanted to provide athletes with disabilities the opportunity to compete at an international level equivalent to that of nondisabled athletes i.e. an Olympics for athletes with disabilities.

Originally started in 1948 as rehabilitation for injured Second World War Veterans, the Paralympic Games were formally held for the first time in Rome with 400 athletes representing 23 countries.

The word "Paralympic" is commonly thought to have been taken from the word "Paraplegic", but the fact is that "Para" is a Latin prefix for "with", making the words' literal translation "With Olympic". The Paralympic Games have been parallel to the Olympic Games since inception.

Rome, Italy, hosted the first Paralympic Summer Games in 1960. The 1988 Paralympic Summer Games in Seoul clearly shifted the Games from a "rehabilitation" model to one of sport and athletic competition. This is also when the city hosting the Olympic Summer Games also hosted the Paralympic Summer Games.

Created in 1989, the International Paralympic Committee, IPC,



coordinates and develops the Paralympic Games. The organization has headquarters in Bonn, and Mr. Philip Craven from Great Britain serves as president. The IPC awards the Paralympics to a host city; determines the sports disciplines and events included in the programme; invites NPCs to participate in each Paralympics; establishes a medical code for Paralympic participants that includes the testing of banned substances; administers the sale of worldwide Paralympic marketing rights; and oversees the activities of the Organising Committees of the Paralympics. IPC VISION, MOTTO, SYMBOL



Vision

To Enable Paralympic Athletes to Achieve Sporting Excellence and Inspire and Excite the World.

Each word in the vision has a clear meaning in defining the ultimate aim of the IPC:

- To enable: this is the primary role of the IPC as an organization – to create the conditions for athlete empowerment through self-determination.
- Paralympic athletes: the primary focus of IPC's activities, in the context of Paralympic athletes, is the development of all athletes, from initiation to elite level.
- To achieve sporting excellence: the goal of the IPC as a sports centred organization.
- To inspire and excite the world: the external result is our contribution to a better world for all people with a disability. To achieve this, relations with external organizations and the promotion of the Paralympic Movement as a whole are of prime importance.

Motto

The spirit of every Paralympic athlete is uncompromising – every day exceeding what others had thought was possible by pushing themselves to the limit. With the motto 'Spirit in Motion' the IPC has captured what the Paralympic Movement is trying to achieve: enabling athletes from all background to unite on a single stage, inspiring and exciting the world with their performances.

Symbol

The new Paralympic Symbol (logo) was launched in 2003. It is a symbol in motion, with three Agitos (from the Latin meaning 'I move') encircling a centre point, emphasizing the role that the IPC has of bringing athletes from all corners of the world together and enabling them to compete. It also emphasizes the fact that Paralympic athletes are constantly inspiring and exciting the world with their performances – always moving forward and never giving up. The new Paralympic Symbol consists of three elements in red, blue and green – the three colours that are most widely represented in national flags around the world.

The previous symbol incorporated the Tae-Geuk, which is a traditional Korean decorative motif. Tae-Geuks were first used in a symbol at the 1988 Paralympic Games in Seoul, Korea. At that time, the symbol consisted of five Tae-Geuks in a configuration and in colours similar to the Olympic Rings, ie, blue, black, red, yellow, and green.

In 1991, the International Olympic Committee (IOC) requested that the IPC modify its symbol, if the symbol was to be used for marketing purposes. The IOC Marketing Department considered the symbol with five Tae-Geuks too similar to the five Olympic Rings, and hence a point of potential confusion for the IOC Sponsorship Programme. The configuration of five Tae-Geuks was allowed to be used at the 1994 Paralympic Winter Games in Lillehammer, Norway. A Paralympic Symbol with three Tae-Geuks was officially launched on at worldwide level at the 1994 World Championships for IPC Sports and 'Mind Body, Spirit' was adopted as the Paralympic motto, which has now been replaced by the motto 'Spirit in Motion'.

The Tae-Geuks were in limited use until the Closing Ceremony of the ATHENS 2004 Paralympic Games. When handing over the flag to Beijing, a flag with the new symbol was used. From then on, the old symbol is no longer in use. (© IPC)

Dear Olympic competitors,



The 10th Paralympic Games in Vancouver 2010 is soon to begin. Paralympic Games started in 1976 as "Handicap Olympics". This very important integration step was first implemented in Albertville 1992.

At the last meeting in Trysil of the entire Olympic and Paralympic teams for Vancouver, we attached our goals and values to the Native American "dream catcher" symbol and the symbol for the whole of mankind – the balance between the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual. These are important elements to have with you for optimizing your performance we achieve in this important Games.

We have a strong and good feeling that we have done our utmost to be as prepared as possible for the Games. Some have faced challenges and not everything has gone smoothly. But the effort is characterised by the systematic hard work that the individual competitor, trainers and support personnel have put in. It has generated considerable energy and created expectations of good experiences and great performances. We have come to Vancouver from the best starting point possible, and the trick now is to unleash this in the most exciting and entertaining competition of them all.

Norway participate in the four sports Sledgehockey, Wheelchaircurling, Cross Country and Biathlon.

We are 27 competitors and 24 trainers and support personnel who have all participated in defining our common goal. We will fight for at least five medals with at least one in teamsport Sledgehockey and Wheelchaircurling. But remember, it is not only we the team who have expectations but also the Norwegian people. This is a good feeling of support to have on board.

We know that it is now up to each and every one of us to perform, but the knowledge that we are many competing together makes us stronger.

Together for great performances.

ICE SLEDGE HOCKEY

Ice Sledge Hockey is the Paralympic version of Ice Hockey. Since its debut on the Paralympic Programme at the Lillehammer 1994 Winter Paralympics, it has quickly become one of the largest attractions for spectators at the Winter Paralympics. It is fast-paced, highly physical and played by male athletes with a physical disability in the lower part of the body. Instead of skates, players use two-blade sledges that allow the puck to pass beneath. Players use two sticks, which have a spike-end for pushing and a blade-end for shooting. Responding to the request of the nations widely and regularly practising the sport of Ice Sledge Hockey, the IPC in 2009 approved an entry provision to allow qualified teams for the Vancouver 2010 Paralympic Winter Games

to enter female athletes to their roster should they wish.

Ice Sledge Hockey is practiced by athletes around 15 countries and is governed by the IPC with co-ordination by the IPC Ice Sledge Hockey Technical Committee. It follows the rules of the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) with modifications.

BIATHLON

Biathlon for athletes with a physical disability was introduced in Innsbruck, Austria, in 1988. At the Paralympic Winter Games in 1992, athletes with a visual impairment were also able to compete in the sport. The competition is open to athletes with a physical disability and blindness/visual impairment. The most important success factor lies in the capability of alternating the skills of physical endurance and shooting accuracy during the competition. Athletes with blindness/visual impairment are assisted by acoustic signals, which depending on signal intensity, indicate when the athlete is on target.

The sport is governed by the IPC with co-ordination by the IPC Nordic Skiing Technical Committee following the modified rules

of the International Biathlon Union (IBU).

CROSS COUNTRY SKIING

Cross-Country Skiing appeared at the 1976 Winter Games in Örnköldsvik, Sweden, for the first time. The competition is open to athletes with a physical disability and blindness/visual impairment. Depending on functional disability, a competitor uses a sit-ski, a chair equipped with a pair of skis. Athletes with blindness/visual impairment compete in the event with a sighted guide. Male and female athletes compete in short distance, middle distance and long distance (rang-

ing from 2.5km to 20km) or participate in a team relay using classical or free techniques. Cross Country Skiing is governed by the IPC with co-ordination by the IPC Nordic Skiing Technical Committee following modified rules of the International Ski Federation (FIS) and is currently practiced by athletes in more than 25 countries. WHEELCHAIR CURLING

Wheelchair Curling is a game of great skill and strategy. The first World Cup in Curling for wheelchair players was held in January 2000 in Crans-Montana, Switzerland. Wheelchair Curling had its debut at the Torino 2006 Paralympic Winter Games. The sport is open to male and female athletes with a physical disability in the lower part of the body. This includes athletes with significant impairments in lower

leg/gait function (eg, spinal injury, cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, double leg amputation, etc), who require a wheelchair for daily mobility.

Each team must be comprised of male and female players. It is governed by and played according to the rules of the World Curling Federation (WCF), with only one modification – no sweeping. In 2009, Wheelchair Curling is practiced by athletes in over 20 countries.

BEST OF NORWAY



17.MAI-TOG: May 17th is Norway's National Day, and celebrates the adoption of the Constitution on the same date in 1814. May 17th is a major event in Norway, and almost all Norwegians take part in the celebrations. All Norwegian school-children take part in Constitution Day parades, all of them dressed in their own local version of the national costume or their Sunday best. The forest of Norwegian flags leaves little doubt it's Norway's Constitution day that's being celebrated. Tourists from all over the world stream into Oslo to see the Children's Parade.

BINDERS: A small twist of metal wire – better known to you as a paper clip. Invented by the Norwegian Johan Vaaler in 1899. In use world-wide.

BRUNOST: A sweet, brown cheese made from cow's milk and /or goat's milk. Originally made in the mountain dairy farms, it's now found on most Norwegian breakfast tables, and is used by hundreds of thousands of people daily as a filling for their lunch-time sandwiches. More than a quarter of all cheese eaten in Norway is Brunost!

BUNAD: National costume with it's origins in peasant clothing. The various regions and districts in Norway have their own versions, and the designs indicate family or geographical ties. Almost everyone who has one wears their 'Bunad' on May 17th, Constitution Day.

HARALD HÅRFAGRE: According to the history books Harald Fairhair was the first King over a united Norway. (Approx. 865–933). The Viking Chieftain who united Norway at the Battle of Hafrsfjord near Stavanger in around 885. It is claimed that all those who have claimed the throne of Norway since are descendants of Harald Fairhair. Fairhair named Eirik Blodøks – the famous Eirik The Red – as his heir to the Throne of Norway.

HARDINGFELE: A uniquely Norwegian form of violin or fiddle with eight strings, four above and four under. The Harding Fiddle dates from around 1650, and quickly spread throughout the Norwegian valleys, gaining popularity as a folk music instrument. The fiddle can be tuned in 30 different ways.

LOFOT-FISKET: An annual fisheries event from February to April for Cod and Spring Cod in the Vestfjord at Lofoten in the County of Nordland. The Vestfjord has been the most stable spawning grounds for Spring Cod for time beyond memory, and has therefore been a winter fairy tale for fishermen for more centuries than the history books can count. The Lofot Fisheries are the basis for a number of both small and large fishing boats along the coastline of Norway

LUSEKOFTE: A knitted pullover with its origins in Setesdalen in Norway. Mainly used by men since the mid-1800's. The pullover is usually "Sheep-wool-black" with a white pattern. The pattern is the "lice". Around 1920, tourists began to notice this uniquely Norwegian garment, and since then it has been one of the popular purchases made by tourists in Norway.

MIDNATTSOL: Norway is often called «The Land of the Midnight Sun». The Midnight Sun literally means that the sun never dips under the horizon, as is the case in Northern Norway during a period in the summer. There is daylight for a full 24 hours and the sun never sets. This phenomena attracts many tourist to Norway's Northern Regions. In strong contrast is the winter darkness, where the sun never shows her face, and the days are as dark as the nights.

OSTEHØVEL: A Norwegian invention in use all over the world. A tool for slicing cheese, invented by the furniture-maker Thor Bjørklund from the Olympic Town of Lillehammer. He patented the cheese slicer in 1925 and started production in 1927. Since then, his cheese slicer has enjoyed world-wide success that we Norwegians are proud of!

SMALAHOVE: A traditional Norwegian dish originating from the villages and hamlets of the West Country. 'Smale' is a dialect word for sheep, and "Smalahove" means sheep's head. The head is singed and/or smoked prior to boiling before being served with boiled potatoes and mashed swede. Not all Norwegian's find the dish so very appealing, with the sheep staring up at you from your plate....

THOR HEYERDAHL: Norwegian ethnographer and zoologist, who has carried out much research into the origins of the peoples of Polynesia. Heyerdahl believed that Polynesia was settled by peoples from America and not from south-east Asia as was the common theory at the time. To prove that American Indians could have sailed the Pacific he carried through the famous Kon-Tiki expedition in 1947. The film of the expedition was awarded the Oscar for best documentary in 1951. Heyerdahl is also famous for the Ra, Ra II and Tigris expeditions.

TRAN: Norwegian health drink based on liver-oil from mainly cod or saithe. 'Tran', or cod-liver oil, was traditionally used both as lamp-oil and as nature's medicine against a number of debilitating illnesses. Nowadays, it is highly valued due to its high percentage of non-saturated fatty acids. Many Norwegians start their day with a dessert spoon of cod-liver oil to keep healthy and in good form. Not very popular with the kids due to its somewhat special flavour....

TØRRFISK: Fisk that is not salted, but dried naturally in the wind- you may have met it as Stockfish or Bacalao. Dried either on special frames or direct on the rocks. Smells VERY strong, Is re-hydrated prior to cooking. One of the oldest fish products in Norway and has been of great importance to the coastal regions. Exported in great quantities to among other countries Portugal - Bacalao.

BEST OF NORWAY



VIKINGSKIP: Norwegian/Nordic vessel from the Viking Era and early middle ages. The ships were used by the Vikings in both war and peace, in the latter as trading vessels. The Vikings were Nordic traders who carried out both trading missions and raids in West and Eastern Europe between 800-1050. The best known Viking Ships, The Gokstad, Tune and Oseberg can all be seen at the Viking Ship Museum at Bygdøy in Oslo.
